## JUMC & Iowa UMConference begin On-Line Giving Opportunity

A link has been created on the lowa UMConference website. Our <u>church name</u> is included in a drop-down list. The donor can leave a comment for specific instructions to the church.

Total gifts will be direct deposited to church's bank account twice-a-month.

Below are some answers to questions we have received regarding the local church online giving option:

1. Will it cost the church anything for this service? The Conference is prepared to allow churches to use the online giving for three months without any fees being deducted from the local church gift total. The Treasurer's Office/ Administrative Services will pick up those costs. After June 30, the fees are .30 per transaction plus approximately 2.9% which is the amount charged to the Conference for the service.

3. How will the church know when a gift is made? The system, will automatically send an email to the church each time a gift is receive. The donor may use an online comment section to designate their gift. Any comments made will be included in the email.

4. How will potential donors see where to give? The online form is pictured to the right here.

8. Is this a secure site to donate through? The lowa Conference page is handled through Braintree (a Pay Pal company) which is a secure encrypted site. At no time does any credit card information stay within the Iowa Conference system. The banking information that our church would submit to our office would be entered into the bank ACH portal and then securely stored.



with worship, we broke facebook! Iowa UMC pastors and churches were informing one another of the problems most of the day. Facebook is a great tool for churches; it was interesting it

happened on Sunday and not a weekday with so many folk working from home during pandemic.

#### **Pastor's Ponderings during the Pandemic** Written <u>April 19</u> in response to announcement to stop isolating at home & back to work as usual:

As much as we all want to be in worship together inside our church building, let us be wise.

Consider how many of our church family, including our pastor, organist & worship assistants, are part of the at-risk group. If just one of them/us would become infected at church because we gathered together too soon, it could be a tragedy.

Think of our building herself as an at-risk person who needs protection by us from the virus.

Currently we hope that she has not been exposed to the virus since only at-risk persons, themselves practicing safety measures, have entered her.

She is over 100 years old, has lots of nooks and crannies, pews and door knobs, tables and chairs that can all continue to be protected from infection if we do not expose her.

Currently we don't believe she has inhaled the coronavirus into her HVAC breathing system. By waiting a few Sundays (June or July even) after the restrictions are lifted, before entering her holy doors, we will hopefully prevent her from contracting COVID-19 unintentionally from us.

Since no one knows how long the coronavirus remains active on surfaces, it just seems wise and practical to protect her and one another.

If we wait for the curve to flatten even more, we are less likely to infect her by accident. If we enter too soon and a Bremer-Black Hawk County outbreak recurs, we would need to thoroughly clean her.

And the thought of introducing chemical disinfectants to her beautiful wood surfaces and newly renovated areas that could ruin finishes, is daunting, expensive, and impossible.

One or more Sundays of staying home to watch online will continue to allow us to worship together in the spirit of the Lord and keep her and us safe for us to return in the near future.

If we can remain patient for another week or more after restrictions are lifted, then we can welcome one another more confidently that we are not sharing the coronavirus or other germs with one another or our building.

Waiting means we can truly celebrate the Resurrection of our Risen Lord without anxiety and fear.



God's Laws on Hygiene Were Ahead of Their Time (www.jw.org)

Shortly before the nation of Israel entered the Promised Land some 35 centuries ago, God said that he would protect them against "the terrible diseases" that they had known in Egypt. (Deuteronomy 7:15) God gave them detailed instructions on disease control and hygiene.

The nation's code of laws required bathing and clothes washing.—Leviticus 15:4-27.

People who were thought to have a communicable disease were quarantined—kept away from others for a time. Before returning, those who recovered from sickness had to wash their garments and bathe in water if they were to be considered "clean."—Leviticus 14:8, 9.

Anyone who touched a dead body was quarantined.—Leviticus 5:2, 3; Numbers 19:16.

Israel's laws reflected medical concepts & views on sanitation that were far ahead of their time.

Elsewhere, primitive standards of hygiene were prevalent. Waste was deposited in streets. Polluted water, contaminated food, and other kinds of refuse created unsanitary conditions that contributed to a high rate of disease and infant mortality.

Ancient medical doctors had little or no knowledge of germs and pathogens. Egyptians used infection-causing "remedies." Water-born parasites were common.
